

2 Timothy 2:8-13

STAYING FOCUSED ON JESUS CHRIST

At His birth, He was given two names, "Jesus" (Matthew 1:21) and "Immanuel" (Matthew 1:22-23). "Jesus" means "Savior," and He was called that all His earthly life. But "Immanuel" means "God with us," and it's more appropriate now than ever. Standing on the mountain in His resurrection body, ready to go back to heaven, Jesus said something He'd never said before: "I will be with you always" (Matthew 28:20). He is with you right now, as you read this. Fix your eyes on Him. The light of Christ surrounds you. The love of Christ enfolds you. The power of Christ protects you. The presence of Christ watches over you. Wherever you are, Christ is... In all your struggles and temptations, fix your eyes on the resurrected Jesus!

2 Timothy is Paul's final exhortation to his spiritual son, Timothy, before he is executed by the Roman Empire under the reign of Nero.

Paul has given Timothy eight specific commands up to this point:

- 1. Do not be ashamed of the gospel (1:8)
- 2. Share with me in suffering for the gospel (1:8)
- 3. Hold tightly to the truth of the gospel (1:13)
- 4. Guard tenaciously the treasure of the gospel (1:14)
- 5. Be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus (2:1)
- 6. Commit the truths of the gospel to faithful people (2:2)
- 7. Endure hardship as a good soldier of Jesus Christ (2:3)
- 8. Consider what I say (2:7)

Paul's ninth command is at the root of all his other commands...
