

Genesis 6:1-22

# **JUDGMENT** ACCORDING TO GOD

The present section of Genesis has been the subject of debate for centuries, most scholars considering it to be one of the most difficult passages to interpret in the Pentateuch. At the center of the discussion is the identity of the "sons of God" and the "daughters of men." Most of the early church fathers interpreted the sons of God to be angels, probably because of certain manuscripts of the Septuagint. But this view was met with resistance from rabbinical circles, for their position was more commonly that the sons of God were human judges. In fact, there was a curse pronounced on anyone taking the angel view (Genesis Rabba 26:5). Later, in the medieval period...there was a preference for the interpretation that the sons of God were Sethites, and the daughters of men, Cainites. Whatever view the expositor takes of some of the details in the passage, the passage as a whole is clearly portraying how wicked the human race had become and indicating that death would be the punishment. This judgment would be severe because the sin was great. -Allen Ross

Genesis 6 is one of the most difficult chapters in all of Scripture to interpret. There is debate regarding the identity of the sons of God, the meaning of 120 years, the identity of the Nephilim, the "regret" of the Lord in creating humanity, and the reality of the Flood itself. But regardless of the interpretive difficulties, the message is clear:

## THE GREATNESS OF THE WORLD'S DEPRAVITY (6:1-13)

- The population greatly increases (6:1).
- of humanity greatly increases (6:2, 5).

#### Who are the "sons of God"?

- 1. Fallen angels. Angels saw the beauty of human women and somehow (whether through possession or transformation) cohabited with them, producing some kind of angel-human mutant beings (Nephilim) that fully corrupted the earth.
- 2. **Mighty kings.** The sons of *elohim* refer to mighty human rulers who began to dominate the earth and assemble large harems. They would also be closely identified with the Nephilim.
- 3. The godly line of Seth. The "sons of God" are those tied to Seth's godly line. They forsook godliness in order to engage in sexual immorality with whomever they wanted. Thus, even the godly were fully corrupted during this age, resulting in the increase of Nephilim, mighty tyrants, who dominated the earth.
